MATERIAL LIST FOR PAINTING

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You may wish to only purchase minimum supplies to begin with and add materials as you go along. Basic paint sets and brush sets are a good way to start. Also, make sure of art store return policy. *

Substrates *

It is up to you to decide on what surface and size you wish to paint. A good minimal size is 9" x 12" canvas, canvas pad or watercolor papers. Bring more than one canvas with you if you choose to work on stretched canvas. Arches watercolor paper, stretch or block (if planning on using watercolor)

* Art supply stores will sometimes offer a basic set of colors and brush sets. (Colors that exceed the basic color palette are more expensive.)

Buy at least mid price-range quality or student grade paints and brushes

Palette:

Deposable palette or finished palette, (art supply store) Alternatives: 16" by 20" or larger ¼" Plexiglas or ¼" Masonite coated with white enamel (1 pint may be purchased from a hardware store)

Palette knife: basic palette knife for mixing paint and as painting tool.

Brushes:

Brush sets contain a combination of Flats, Filberts, and Rounds are a good way to start. All brushes types run large to small.

Rounds are important when starting a drawing for a painting, and Flats and Filberts are good for filling in larger areas.

Filberts tend to blend strokes more than Flats. Buy as many different brushes as your budget allows. You will find which brushes best serve your method.

For oil paint: Hog bristle or other natural hair

For acrylic paint: Mixed synthetic

<u>For watercolor</u>: Sable brushes are a lot softer than natural bristle brushes; these are better for watercolor painting and glazing for finishing a painting.

Clean-up:

Washing your brushes thoroughly after each use will prolong their lives. *Dawn* dish soap is perfect.

- <u>Rags or paper towels are a necessity.</u> Brown classroom paper towels are not effective.
- Soap for cleaning brushes

For Oil Painters only:

- **Oil painters** need some type of premixed medium to improve flow and drying of oils such as Winsor & Newton Liquin or Gambin Galkyd.
- **Solvents-** Must use only <u>odorless paint thinner</u> for thinning oil paint and clean-up of brushes.

Additional supplies to consider:

- A tool or tackle box for storage
- Straight edge razor w/ handle
- Sandpaper for smoothing gesso
- Sketchbook, pens, pencils
